Focussed learning, creativity and risk-taking underpin our curriculum.

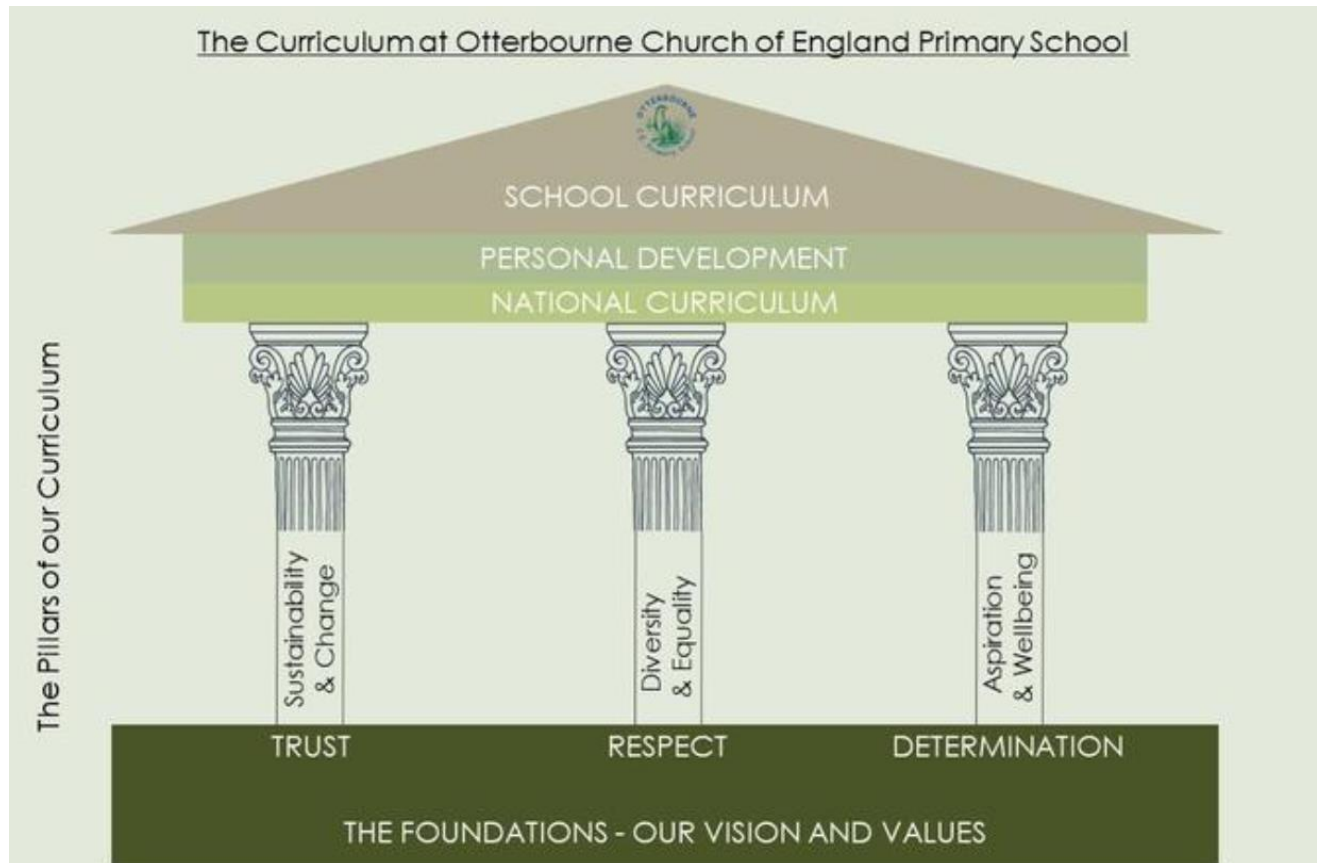
At Otterbourne Church of England Primary School, we strive for excellence in all that we do. At the heart of everything are the children. This is a nurturing environment where we recognise that children are not always ready to learn. We support the personal, social and emotional needs of children so that they develop self-awareness, self-confidence and inherent learning behaviours that will see them succeed...and feel pride.

We are a community school, with strong links to St. Matthew's Church and the village hall, and we have built our curriculum so that our children learn about village life as well as their place in a global community.

Mistake-making, editing and improving are essential elements of our curriculum as we shape children to aim higher and aspire to be the best versions of themselves. Our children are taught to not compare themselves to others, but to compare themselves now to themselves at a point in the past. Children need to see the fruits of their labour, recognise how they have been successful and be encouraged to go even further.

Our Values in our Curriculum

Our school curriculum is developed on the foundation of our core Christian values.



Through our school curriculum, our focus on personal development, our vision for children to find success and pride in their achievements, and the enrichment activities that run throughout the school year, we hope to give every child a strong foundation as they progress through the stages of their education and into adulthood.

Our PSHE curriculum introduces children to valuable learning behaviours, that we embed throughout their time here. These support children to recognise how they can adapt their own learning so they find success. We call this Building Learning Power and we celebrate successful application of these 'powers' in our 'Mission of the Month'.

Daily Life in School – what you need to know.

Arriving at school. The school doesn't have its own visitor car park. There are a small number of reserved spaces within the school gates, which includes an accessible space.

The best access point to the school is the small, grey, pedestrian gate along the footpath as this leads to a pelican crossing on the school grounds. Access can also be made via the two green gates at the end of the driveway that runs alongside the church grounds. In all cases, please be aware that some children arrive by car during school hours and some moving vehicles are now near-silent.

Car parking is available, subject to spaces, in the village car park on Cranbourne Drive from which it is a very short walk along the footpath by the school meadow up to the school. At the start and end of the school day, the village car park can be very busy.

If children are being dropped off for school, this should be no earlier than 8:45am. The school gate remains closed until this time so children will be unaccompanied. The school will always endeavour to support families where alternative arrangements are required and The Holt offers before and after school 'wrap around' care.

In the interests of site security and safeguarding, the school operates a 'free-flow' entry system whereby children come in to school directly after the gate is opened at 8:45am. Parents/carers are not expected to accompany their children in to the school and should not visit classrooms without prior appointment.

We do recognise that those early days can be tricky and there are often little messages that make all the difference to the children's wellbeing, so there will always be somebody from each Key Stage 1 class available on the playground each morning. Messages for Key Stage 2 teachers can be passed to the member of staff at the school gate, or to the office team.

The school has strict safeguarding procedures in place to protect staff and children and visitors are not allowed on site without first signing in at the school office.

Late arrivals, those entering after 9:05, should report to the school office where an adult will need to sign in the child on the school's entry system.

At the end of the school day, Early Years and Key Stage 1 children will be brought out to the front of the school to be collected at 3:25pm. Details for collection are always included in the first termly newsletter. Currently, children in Reception Class are brought on to the path by the front of the school/hall doors and Key Stage 1 children are brought on to the 'meadow' playground. At 3:30pm, Key Stage 2 children are brought to the top of the 'church' playground to the left of the school.

Parents are asked to make eye contact and wave to teachers (preferably at the time they see the teacher with their child) so that we can ensure a safe release at the end of the day. Teachers will very quickly get to know names and faces of those collecting each day, so if there is any change, this needs to be communicated to the school office as soon as possible.

If you are aware that you will miss the regular pick-up time, please contact the office as soon as you are able giving an ETA. Children will always be brought in to the office once the daily pick-up is completed so they remain safe until you arrive. If there is no communication about being late, children will be brought in to the office and we will try to make contact with you.

We discourage any child from walking home without an adult, until Year 6 when this is discussed with the children and parents. With our commitment to safeguarding, we take an active stance when considering the needs of each individual child and will always welcome an open conversation where our views can be considered. Please do not be offended if we question someone collecting your child. We always have the children's safety in mind.

During their time with us, there may be occasions when decisions and behaviours have affected the learning, safety or wellbeing of others. In the first instance, class teachers and other adults around the school will support children to 'reflect and repair'. This means helping them to reflect on their mistakes and consider alternative approaches, and supporting children to repair relationships, through simple act such as an apology.

Where necessary, children may be brought to a member of the Senior Leadership Team, and if it is considered appropriate, we will inform you immediately by email so that you can be made aware and we can agree the most suitable approach to addressing problems together. We believe that an open and honest partnership between home and school is the best way to helping your children navigate the challenges of daily life.

School Uniform

In order to maintain a strong sense of identity and belonging, we require all pupils to wear full school uniform. Any cultural or religious variations to this must be brought to the attention of the Headteacher.

Please ensure that all items of uniform and sports clothing are clearly labelled, and continue to check that labels have not become detached over time.

The school uniform consists of:

- White polo shirt for Early Years and Key Stage 1
- White polo shirt or white collared shirt with school tie in Key Stage 2
- Green jumper or cardigan (with or without a school logo)
- Grey or black, smart and plain trousers, shorts, skirt or culottes
- Grey pinafore
- White or grey socks
- Grey, black or bottle-green tights
- Black shoes or boots (these should be plain, sensible and flat)
- Green gingham dress with short sleeves and flat collar

Children are encouraged to take pride in their uniform and are expected to wear ties with a smart knot and ensure shirts are tucked in at all times. In hot weather, children can untuck shirts and remove ties for outdoor play. This change will be indicated by the Headteacher.

Children are also encouraged to have a sturdy water bottle in school each day. These should be simple and inexpensive as they will be used outdoors in warmer weather. There is also limited space and there is always the risk of loss or damage.

PE KIT

When they arrive in school, all children are placed in one of our four houses, which comes with an associated colour.

Children coming in to Year R will be assigned a house in the previous term so that parents can make a choice about which PE kit to purchase.

The PE kit consists of:

- Plain white (or house-coloured), short-sleeved, round-neck T-shirt
- Plain black shorts
- Plain trainers or plimsolls – these are for outdoor use.
- Plain, dark-coloured, jogger bottoms and sweat top – for outdoor use in colder weather

PE kit should be available in school at all times to allow some flexibility in time-tabling. Kit will be sent home at the end of each half-term for washing and should be returned on the first day of the new half-term. Kit should be kept in a drawstring bag (which should be clearly named).

Jewellery/Wearable Technology

Due to the active nature of school, the wearing of any type of jewellery is discouraged. Many children are now more aware of their own health and wellbeing, so school does allow the wearing of simple 'Fitbit' type step counters but this is at the child/families risk and school will not accept any responsibility for losses or breakages. Devices with features that support communication, social media, photos etc are not permitted.

Should a pupil have pierced ears, these must be plain studs. If studs can not be removed for physical activities, they must be covered with a plaster (or tape) which should be provided by home and applied by the child. If you are planning on getting your child's ears pierced, please consider the timing of this as it can have an impact on school life. The best time would be the first weekend of the summer holidays as this gives enough time for studs to remain in place undisturbed for the suggested six weeks.

Hair

Hair should be neat and tidy and where accessories are worn, these should be green as they are considered part of the school uniform.

Due to health and safety reasons, as well as to prevent a barrier to learning, all long hair should be tied back using a green hair accessory.

Outdoor Learning

Across the school, we encourage teachers to plan lessons that make the most of our incredible grounds. There is a high possibility that children will be outside in light rain and the added chance of mud around the site.

Teachers will communicate with you when there is a planned timetable change, so that children can bring in long trousers and long sleeves (for learning in the meadow) or wellies (for muddy conditions). Ideally, these will be part of the kit that children leave in school.
